
Global recognition

The key points of the position statement

- Patients with inflammatory diseases who receive moderate or high-risk antiinflammatory therapies might be considered as an increased risk group for severe COVID-19 and appropriate measures should be taken in order to protect them.
- Initiation of immuno-suppressive/modulatory therapies should be done with caution, taking into account the severity of the underlying inflammatory disease, the type of anti-inflammatory treatment, and the risk of exposure to the SARS-CoV-2 views.
- Discontinuation of anti-inflammatory therapies in patients who have not been exposed to or infected with the SARS-CoV-2 virus is not recommended.
- In patients who become infected with SARS-CoV-2, anti-inflammatory therapies should be discontinued, except in special cases.
- Specialty physicians should actively participate in the Interdisciplinary Teams caring for patients with inflammatory diseases during COVID19 infection.


